Father O'Donnell was pastor of St. Joseph the Worker parish in Berkeley and a regular participant in the protests at the School of the Americas in Georgia and not long ago served prison time as a consequence. Regardless of your views of civil disobedience, whether involving the clergy or not, Father O'Donnell was an inspiration to many because of the strength of his convictions and his belief that he was truly answering Christ's call to seek peace. However, Father O'Donnell died a few weeks ago and, at his request, was buried in a pauper's grave. He would have been an inspirational speaker. Please pray for him.
